PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



Another term has started in a very positive way. **The language and cultural study tour to Indonesia** was a great success. It was a wonderful opportunity to experience another culture; put into practice the language learned in Indonesian classes at school; and explore the many cultural landmarks that had been arranged for us. I was very impressed with the 25 students who went on the trip. They were inquisitive, enthusiastic and took up every challenge that was presented.



They mixed together so well, with students from Year 8 to Year 12. From eating at roadside warungs, to bargaining for a Rolex watch, sampling a range of new foods, from snake fruit, to spicy mie goreng, chicken feet and sticky rice. Indonesia surpassed expectations. We were fortunate to have excellent guides and drivers throughout our time. They were very informative and helpful, but more than that, they passed on a love of their country and culture. We had lots of fun. We climbed the steps of Borobodur, a huge Buddhist temple outside of Jogjakarta; went to some extraordinarily beautiful puppet theatre and cultural plays, learned the skills of the gamelan orchestra; 4-wheel drove around the base of Mount Merapi, an active volcano; released 4 day old turtles; learned about a project to revitalise the coral reefs off the North-East coast of Bali and finally, met with students from our sister school at Pemuteran. This has left us all with incredible

memories and a real understanding of the importance of studying languages as a way to open communication and break down fears of difference. On a personal note, it was a real pleasure to spend time with students and share this great experience.

A very special thank you to Mrs Pamela Van T'Hoff, from the Village Baxter, who sewed 70 tote bags and knitted a huge number of beautiful teddies to take to students in our sister school. The children were thrilled and clutched hold of their bags which contained all the goods so kindly donated by members of the school community. Thank you all. Your kindness was very much appreciated and will most definitely make a difference in the Pemuteran School.

Our VCAL students have worked hard to ensure our **coffee club** has had a very successful launch this term. Students undertook Barista Training and are now offering a range of coffee options for staff at recess and lunchtime several times each week. They are also offering on-line ordering for staff, which is proving very popular. After trialling a number of coffee samples, the wonderful aromas are filling the C Block corridor. Students need to manage the ordering and are working with our Business Manager to learn the basics of bookwork. After an initial start-up grant, the group hope this small business will cover the costs and may even get into a profit situation. Congratulations to all the students involved. Great work!



Rehearsals for **"High School Musical"** are in full speed with a high level of interest in ticket sales already noted. The Arts Academy students are also in full swing polishing their Wakakirri performance, which is on in only a few weeks' time. The PAPE building is echoing with song and dance at the moment.

It was very pleasing to see parents and family members attend the **ASPIRE evenings** this term. I had the pleasure of presenting many of the Senior School Awards and was impressed to see so many students acknowledged for their efforts. I was particularly pleased to present the new Principal Awards that focus on Pride, Unity and Respect. These awards

acknowledge students who have inspired others, have nurtured pride in their school and the environment or have promoted excellence through their work. The first recipients in Senior School were: Ethan D for his involvement in The Rose Project, developing a detailed plan to redevelop our central courtyard. Kobe M, for her role in promoting Leadership and her involvement in The Rose Project. Jordan D for his Leadership, exceptional ability to support peers and his organisation of events to promote fun and wellbeing as a balance with study. Senna F for representing the College as one of only two Student Ambassadors chosen from around the State, to speak at the recent Graham Clark Oration. This important occasion brought prominent scientists from around the country and from overseas to discuss the amazing breakthroughs in scientific research, such as the medical use of nano technology. Congratulations to all of these students.

By the end of this week, the **subject selection process** will be complete. From there we run all those choices through the timetabling program to arrive at the subject blockings that will accommodate the majority of student choices. We then look at the staffing required to deliver the curriculum and the programs that will run in 2019. Thank you all for ensuring this process has met the time frame outlined through Compass.

We have recently reviewed our **Co-operative Classroom Procedures**. This is our school wide approach to student management and is underpinned by our view that Learning is our priority. After a great deal of consultation, we have revised the rules at Mount Erin College to ensure a safe and productive learning environment for every student. The rules and rights are based on the principles of respect and the right to learn. They will be included in this newsletter to ensure all members of our school community understand our commitment to learning and our expectations for all. We are in the process of finalising our Respectful Relationships Policy, which reiterates our belief that at Mount Erin College, students will learn and thrive in an environment where we respect everyone's right to learn and right to be heard; where different views are respected, and concerns can be raised and addressed in a fair and reasonable manner. The policy will be sent out to all members of the College community later on this term.

PRINCIPAL CLASS DETENTIONS

The Principal Class have introduced a detention on a Friday afternoon from 3-5pm beginning at the start of term 3. These are for high level incidents or for students who have significant amounts of overdue work. A member of the Principal Class will run the detention and it will be expected that the student/s attending are working solidly for 2 hours. One of the aims of introducing this high level of detention is to reduce the number of students receiving suspensions by continuing inappropriate behaviours. We will be working with the students to help them understand the reasons why they have received a high level detention and what they can do to avoid any further consequences in the future.

The detention will run from 3-5pm every Friday and it is Non-Negotiable. A Principal Class detention may be issued for:

- Causing deliberate damage to school property or equipment
- Failure to attend an ASD on 1 or more occasions
- Failure to meet significant work requirements
- Not returning a GISS on 3 or more occasions
- Receiving 3 or more GISS in a week
- Wagging or Truancy
- Any other high level incident deemed necessary by a member of the Principal Class

If your son/daughter finds themselves being issued with this level of detention, you will be contacted by a Year Level Coordinator, the Sub-School Leader or a member of the Principal Class to explain why this is necessary.

2018 Parent Opinion Survey

WE WANT OUR PARENTS TO TELL US WHAT THEY THINK!

Our school is conducting a survey to find out what parents think of our school. The Parent Opinion Survey is an annual survey offered by the Department of Education and Training that is conducted amongst a sample of randomly selected parents. It is designed to assist schools in gaining an understanding of parents' perceptions of school climate, student behaviour and student engagement. Our school will use the survey results to help inform and direct future school planning and improvement strategies.

Approximately 30 per cent of parents will be invited to participate in this year's survey. All responses to the survey are anonymous. This year the Parent Opinion Survey will be conducted from:

Monday 23rd July – Sunday 26th August.

The survey will be conducted **online**, only takes **10-15 minutes** to complete, and can be accessed at any convenient time within the fieldwork period on desktop computers, laptops, tablets or smartphones. The online survey will be available in a range of languages other than English. These include: Arabic, Vietnamese, Mandarin, Chin (hakha), Hindi, Japanese, Somali, Turkish, Punjabi and Greek.

The survey results will be reported back to our school at the end of September. The survey results will be communicated to parents through the College's annual report.



BARC. The animals were very happy too and of course the smallest dog was quick to grab the biggest toy.




After checking out the Melbourne Magistrates' Court students were able to take a break and grab a bite to eat at Melbourne Central before heading into the Supreme Court. At the Supreme Court students were taken on a quick tour where we ended up in a modern day Supreme Court room that is often used for civil cases. Our 2 guest tour guides were absolutely amazing and took the students through the key points of the criminal justice system and gave the students a brief insight into the types of cases heard in the Supreme Court.



We then got an overview of a current case that had been running in the criminal court, and we were able to go in to view the judges summing up to the jury regarding a murder case that occurred in 2016. Although students were super excited to see a murder trial in action, they did end up coming to the realisation that it isn't as exciting as what the movies make it all out to be, but still an incredible experience for them all!

VTAC – Tertiary application process starting for Year 12 students

Students received their VTAC Year 11 and 12 guide at assembly last week and will be supported throughout the application process.

All Year 12s are asked to make a VTAC appointment with the Careers Co-ordinator Chris Wood to finalise their 8 course

preferences for Tertiary entry. VCAL students wishing to apply through VTAC should make a separate individual appointment.


